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25 April 95 27 Note Present status of SDLP Bilaterals with (a) UUP and DUP; (b) Sinn Fein and (c) UDP and PUP SDLP-DUP The only SDLP-DUP meeting to date was held on 12 April. 1. No further meetings have yet been arranged. 2. The SDLP was represented by John Hume; Sean Farren; Eddie McGrady and Joe Hendron. The DUP delegation included Paisley; Peter Robinson; Rev. William McCrea and Nigel Dodds. 3. Sean Farren in a recent discussion made the following comments on the meeting: discussions were courteous but not very positive; the DUP opened by asking SDLP support for a Constitutional Convention involving the list system; Robinson said this would assist the DUP to engage in talks with Sinn Fein since all parties in the Convention would have an explicit and fresh mandate to participate in dialogue; Hume rejected this proposal as contrary to the three strand process and emphasised the SDLP view that the Framework Document represents an important basis for future discussions; Paisley said that if the Framework Document is "explicitly" on the table in future talks, the DUP will not be able to participate; the <u>DUP</u> delegation gave a clear indication that they will not be able to enter future talks if Sinn Fein

- 2 are present; Robinson said, however, that if a constitutional Convention were to be elected, all parties would have a right to participate. He went on to say that 50 Convention members could be elected on a list system with the North as a single constituency. This would avoid elected members having any "constituency" representation role in addition to a negotiation mandate; Farren concluded by describing the meeting as low key but essentially negative. SDLP-UUP 4. This meeting was also held on 12 April with the UUP represented by Molyneaux; Jim Nicholson; Reg Empey and Roy Beggs. The SDLP delegation was the same as for the DUP meeting. 5. Farren made the following observations on the meeting: the discussion was much more diffuse than at the DUP meeting and with hardly any discussion on substantive political issues; there was a lengthy discussion on the Washington Conference and NI companies likely to participate; both sides expressed concern at the dilution of the role of Government Departments through the creation of "next step agencies". McGrady, who feels especially strongly on this, remarked that any future devolved administration may find that there is nothing left to administer;

- 3 -Molyneaux said that the "Blueprint for Stability" remains the basic UUP policy position for future talks. Hume in response said that the SDLP believes the Framework Document provides the most worthwhile basis for future dialogue; it was agreed that the two delegations will meet again on 1 May for more substantive discussions. SDLP-Sinn Fein 6. Three meetings have now taken place between the SDLP and Sinn Fein. The SDLP has been represented by Mark Durkan; Alex Attwood; John Hendron and Brid Rogers. Sinn Fein has been represented by Tom Hartley; Mitchell McLaughlin; Ann Speed and Conor Murphy. Mark Durkan recently made the following comments on the discussions: Sinn Fein appear increasingly determined to "force the pace" on the agenda; the most recent meeting centered on the Framework Document; Durkan at this meeting outlined the background to the 1992 Talks (Strands One and Two) and stressed that a sine qua non for the SDLP in any future agreement must be the establishment of strong North-South structures; Mitchell McLaughlin said Sinn Fein is encouraged by evidence of an increasing all-Ireland perspective on the part of both Governments (Durkan took this as meant mainly in the context of the Framework Document);

- 6 -Durkan said today that he believes, on the basis of the discussions to date, that Sinn Fein is especially keen to develop electoral arrangements with the SDLP wherever possible. Durkan said he expects Sinn Fein will shortly return to the issue of an electoral arrangement for the next Westminster elections but that the SDLP will continue to "kick to touch". There is already considerable local SDLP irritation in 14. West Tyrone at recent media reports that Martin McGuinness will be given a free run in the Constituency in exchange for Sinn Fein standing down in Mid-Ulster. [Joe Byrne, the most likely SDLP candidate in West Tyrone, said in a recent discussion that the party locally will do everything possible to prevent any arrangement being agreed with Sinn Fein. Byrne added that he does not believe sufficient SDLP voters would back McGuinness to assure victory, even if an SDLP Sinn Fein pact were agreed]. The next SDLP-Sinn Fein bilateral is scheduled for later 15. this week. Durkan expects that Sinn Fein will ask SDLP intentions regarding the forthcoming North Down byelection. The SDLP, as of now, remains divided on whether to run a candidate and no decision seems likely to be taken until early May. SDLP-UDP/PUP Three meeting have been held to date between the SDLP and 16. the UDP/PUP. The SDLP has been represented by Farren and Attwood and the UDP/PUP by McMichael, Hutchinson and Ervine. Attwood in a recent discussion made the following points: exchanges of views have so far been general and tentative:

- 7 -McMichael has stressed that a major purpose of the dialogue is to ascertain what the SDLP can do to ensure that the Loyalist parties are not excluded from future talks. [Attwood commented that there is a "deep vulnerability" on this that keeps surfacing in the discussions]; in Attwood's view, the UDP/PUP have no thought-out positions on possible outcome from future talks and "keep circling around the edges on all the important themes"; a deep hostility and distrust of the DUP is a common theme with both the UDP and PUP; to date, the discussions have ranged from general analysis of the Framework Document to the position of the UDA in South Belfast; in summary, Attwood said that the discussions so far have essentially been "getting to know you" sessions. He expects that there will be two more informal meetings (one next week) and that more structured meetings involving delegations from each side will begin over the summer; Attwood concluded that the main value of the meetings is that they are taking place and that they provide a useful mechanism to ease a palpable sense of political isolation and apprehension on the part of the Loyalist parties.
