Irish President visits Peace Centre

On 5th June, the President of Ireland will visit the Peace Centre opened in memory of Tim and Johnathan who were killed in the IRA bombing of Warrington in 1993. Colin and Wendy Parry issued the invitation at a meeting they had earlier this year with the former Taoiseach, Bertie Ahern and the Irish Ambassador David Cooney.

President McAleese will visit the Tim Parry Johnathan Ball Foundation for Peace at their purpose built Peace Centre in Warrington. The purpose of the visit is for the President to learn about the conflict resolution work the Foundation has been undertaking over the last 15 years.

The Foundation has worked with 20,000 young people and adults to tackle some of the key issues facing our communities today – prejudice, discrimination and violence. Its innovative educational and leadership programmes are in demand across the U.K and its 'Survivors for Peace' programme, which works with adults affected by terrorism or politically motivated violence, is networked across Europe.

Founder and Chair, Colin Parry, said: "We are delighted that President McAleese has chosen to visit the Peace Centre. The Foundation was set up as a result of a terrorist attack and we now work with young people from different cultures, faiths and backgrounds, showing how conflict can be resolved non-violently."
