Group to hold meeting in Belfast

An amnesty for killers could be one of the options considered by a body set up to look at

ways of dealing with the legacy of the Troubles.

Such a move would allow people to own up to unsolved murders.

Last year, the former Northern Ireland Secretary of State, Peter Hain, set up a body to find a way with dealing with the legacy left by more than 30 years of bloodshed.

The Consultative Group on the Past is headed by former Church of Ireland Primate, Lord Eames, and the former Policing Board vice-chairman Denis Bradley.



They have met victims`

groups across the island of Ireland, and tonight in Belfast`s Holiday Inn hold the first of seven meetings across Northern Ireland before the end of the month.

The group has held discussions with the two governments, and police on both sides of the border.
