Adams denies IRA involved in murder

Republicans not involved Sinn Fein president Gerry Adams today claimed criminals and not republicans were behind the murder of a 21-year-old Co Armagh man which has cast a new shadow over the future of the Stormont power-sharing executive.

Following warnings from Ian Paisley's Democratic Unionists and the Ulster Unionists today about the political ramifications if claims that Paul Quinn was beaten to death by the Provisional IRA are proven, Mr Adams said he believed it may have been linked to fuel smuggling.

And the West Belfast MP also urged anyone with information about the savage killing in Co Monaghan to give it to the police on both sides of the border.

"There is no republican involvement whatsoever in this man's murder," he said.

"The people involved are criminals. They need to be brought to justice and it is fairly obvious to me that this is linked to fuel smuggling and to criminal activity."

The family of Mr Quinn, from Cullyhanna, have alleged he was lured over the border and beaten to death at farm buildings in Castleblayney, Co Monaghan, by an IRA gang following a dispute with south Armagh republicans.

He died in hospital a short time later.

In a statement the family said: "We believe that he was abducted by the Provisional movement and beaten to death."

Following calls from independent unionist MEP Jim Allister for no equivocation between the actions of individual IRA members and the organisation, senior Democratic Unionist and Ulster Unionist members, whose parties have been sharing power with Sinn Fein since May,

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expressed unease about the murder.


Democratic Unionist MP Jeffrey Donaldson said: "Clearly, if the IRA has been involved in some way in the murder of Mr Quinn then that will have very serious consequences in terms of the political process.

"The DUP will be giving this matter urgent attention and will be seeking to obtain from the police information that is needed about the circumstances and background to the murder of Mr Quinn."
