

"The Chief Constable (of the Police Service of Northern Ireland) takes those things very seriously.

"Again let me remind you of the Chief Constable's words in relation to this - which is that we will do everything we can to help bring Paul Quinn's killers to justice.

"That means we are conscious of the need to make sure there is adequate protection for



those who may wish to help - not only people who may wish to help police with their enquiries but who actually may be prepared to go into the witness box.

"We will do everything we can to build that climate of confidence so that people who are brave enough to come forward and actually reveal the killers can do so."

Mr Quinn, who was 21 and from Cullyhanna, was lured across the border to an isolated farm in Co Monaghan last October and beaten to death by a gang.

It was claimed yesterday by SDLP Assembly member Dominic Bradley that a young man who was with Paul Quinn when he was lured over the border received a death threat from the Provisional IRA.

However, that was strenuously denied by Sinn Fein MP Conor Murphy who claimed the police did not state the threat came from a specific group.



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
