THE DUP's Gregory Campbell has given a guarded response to the establishment of a new group to

draw up proposals on how to deal with the legacy of the Troubles in the North.

The British government has appointed former Policing Board vice-chairman Denis Bradley and ex-Church of Ireland Primate Robin Eames to chair the body.

They will examine whether the North needs a South Africa-style Truth Commission or some other mechanism to come to terms with its violent past.

Gregory Campbell says it is crucial the group makes a distinction between "the innocent and the guilty―.

He said: "The establishment of an Independent Consultative Group by Peter Hain to deal with the legacy of the past, while having some potential for a positive resolution, could also be counter productive.

"This group must not

fail to take account of the fact that there were thousands of people in Northern Ireland, irrespective of religious affiliation, who were entirely innocent and yet either were severely injured or killed, while there were others who, although they suffered, also did so while carrying out illegal terrorist acts.

"It remains to be seen if those in membership of this Independent Group are prepared to face up to this issue; if they are, they will have done a service to all those innocents who have suffered in atrocities; if not, they will have unwittingly or otherwise have helped to engage in revisionism on a massive scale.â €•
