Campbell calls for apology from McGuinness

East Derry MP Gregory Campbell has tabled a motion at Westminster calling for Sinn Féin's Martin McGuinness to make a full disclosure of any IRA activities he may have been involved in. The DUP MP condemned the Deputy First Minister for comments made in a radio interview last weekend where he said he wanted to kill every British soldier on the streets of Derry in the aftermath of Bloody Sunday.

Mr. Campbell said he was "disgusted" by the remarks and said they ignored killings carried out by the IRA before and after Bloody Sunday.

"Like many people, I was disgusted by Martin McGuinness's ham-fisted attempt to play to the Sinn Fein base at the weekend by claiming he would have killed every British soldier he could after Bloody Sunday in 1972.

"Having been forced to sign up to policing and British legal institutions and sitting in Stormont, a building Sinn $F\tilde{A}$ ©in vowed to bring down, administering British rule, one can see why Mr. McGuinness is reduced to petulant comments such as these in order to keep Sinn $F\tilde{A}$ ©in's hardcore supporters on-side. The truth of the matter however, is that comments such as these have no place in sensible political discourse," he said.

Mr. Campbell also called for Martin McGuinness to make an "unreserved apology" to the victims of IRA violence.

Limavady Colr. Leslie Cubitt also said he was disgusted by Mr. McGuinness's comments, but not surprised.

Speaking at a council meeting on Tuesday night in Limavady, the Ulster Unionist Coalition Colr. asked: "Was he not an active member of the IRA on that day? Is he still a member of the army council?"

Mr. Cubitt went on to say: "The thing that worries me most is that the DUP MLAs give Marty the respect by allowing him to be our Deputy First Minister.

He added: "Is it not time for them to pull the plug on this so called democracy, this charade at Stormont, or is the lure of money and power too powerful to have a conscience?"
