Omagh row will not help victims

AS a former policeman, the lord chief justice and various politicians engaged in a war of words yesterday over comments made about key prosecution witnesses at the Omagh bombing trial, it illustrated once again how, as the father of one of the victims put it, "the criminal justice system had failed them".

It is natu to disagree with michael Gahagher, whose son Aluen uled that awith day. Since 1990 the failines of all the victims have waited in vain for a successful prosecution. They have listened to promises from government spokesmen among others that those responsible would be brought to book.

This dispute involving the evidence of two police officers has done nothing to increase confidence in the criminal justice system.
