"The claim that it was simply a case of bad apples does not stand up to scrutiny. It was a policy decision which stretches directly to Downing Street and as BBC 'Spotlight' highlighted also involved the support of sections of the judiciary in the six counties.

"Sinn Féin will continue to support the families of those killed through the British policy of collusion in South Armagh and elsewhere in their campaign for the truth.
