

The most popular ideology among University administrators and student official is the conception of the university as a community. This attitude prevails in spite of the patently undemocratic power structure and total lack of social equality between teachers, students and employees. This theory produces the inaccurate idea that students and teachers are harmoniously co-operating in the acquistion and transmission of knowledge under the guidance of a just and kind administration and suggests that no conflicts exists despite the obvious division of functions in the University.

SOCIETY

The other prevalent ideology, generally

voiced by senile academics, is a yearning for a return to the medieval concep of a university where learning is for learning sake and the institution where this takes place is removed completely from the conflicts and problems which exist in advanced industrial society. Both these ideologies fail to appreciate fail to appreciate the true function of a Univ ersity in a modern society. The latter theory suggests a grotesque utopianism where lear ing should be the province of a privileged minority who succeed it being allowed by a benign social struct ure to enter this clique. This is a theor for middle aged drop-outs who wan to disregard society and instead discusirrelevant theories in sherry soaked sen ior common rooms at a very safe dist ance from the ordinary louts who inhabi the streets and don't know about th Roman Empire. The idea of the "Univ ersity as a community" is a much mor insidious camaflage and serves only to mystify in the minds of most students the essential repressive power structur which exists in most colleges of furthe education.

UNIVER SITY

Our university is representative of th community theory and as such the re ations of domination in it are opaque Generally they are made apparent onl when the bureaucracy is provoked into showing its true dictatorial nature an even then there is a danger that call for direct protest action will serve on to prevent consideration of the tru problem i.e. a need for structural r form. Our comrades in France have suggested that there cannot be a tree university without a free society and this we naturally accept. We maintain, however, that this does not preclude us from putting forward a transitional reform programme because, since the social revolution will not occur simultaneously with the university revolution, we in the university have a unique role to play. Only by becoming really aware of the contradictions and struggles in capitalists society can students become effective generators of demands for radical changes in society. We must also continually relate the struggle of the working class who suffer similiar forms of ahenation and lack of control in the places where they work.

Our first demand must be for entrance to University regardless of age or qualification. If we accept the present admission criteria we accept in inherent ehtism, that learning is the province only of a chosen few who succeed in lasting through the schools programme which requires more stamina than creative ability. We must also demand the abolition of examinations which serve only to prevent true education and encourage only blind mesmerising of usually irrelevant facts which are churned out when the orders are given.

This is possibly the most important and immediate demand. Too many good students who cannot adjust to a three hour ordeal are thrown out of University each year and find themselves irrelevant in our society because they cannot produce a piece of paper showing proof of a successful apprenticeship in the degree factory.

We urge all students to consider these brief proposals and we call on all radical students to avoid being compromised in their demands by offers of "consultation" and active by the University administrators. Our basic demand is simple control of the university we work in by teachers and students in a truly democratic matters. No minority has a right to manipulate and use the members of this university. We invite all students to join the struggle.

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
