Like in other newsrooms across the region, everyone in the Journal knew and respected Eamon Melaugh. He was never idle and looking back on his life it is clear to see that he channeled that drive and energy to extraordinary effect.

It is only in review that you realise just how extraordinary his life was.

Eamon Melaugh had a C.V. as impressive as any of them. A civil rights leader and welfare advocate and advisor, a talented and prolific photographer whose works were published several years back, a social activist, a peace advocate, the founder of a charity that raised almost £1m for, and, crucially, raised awareness of, the plight of impoverished children and those with leprosy. I could go on.

I remember a particularly pleasant afternoon spent with him at his flat in Alexander House for an in-depth article about his life and his work with the charity he founded, Action With Effect, several years back now. He was warm, hospitable, intelligent, quick and witty with knowledge, passion and wisdom that the years had not dimmed.
