AMB WASHINGTON OURSELLOPS A

WARRINGTON BOMB

COMMENTS BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE, SIR PATRICE MAYNER, WHEN INTERVIEWED BY UTV OF THE WARRINGTON BONDING AND ITS AFTERNATE:
STORMONT CASTLE, MORDAY 22 HARCE 1893

question

Secretary of State, first of all, do you think that this attack, this atrocity in Warrington is a watershed with the tragic death of the 3-year-old child. Do you think that there will be demands, inevitable demands on the Government to do much more to root out these terrorists as a result of this?

Secretary of State

I think that it has bit the imagination and the conscience of the public in a way that nothing else has done. I hope that it has done the same to the IRA and those who tolerate them. Everything is being done here in Morthern Ireland and in Great Britain to catch terrorists and to bring them to justice. What we need is more help for the police. Every time scretching like this happens there is scandody who knows a bit about it. There are people who know that scenthing is likely to bappen. What I way to them is - how many more children's faces are going to be blown away; how many more young children are going to be killed, because you have not brought yourself to tell the police what you know.

Question

Do you think it will fuel demands to encourage that debate, to stimulate the overall debate, to promote the idea of a British withdrawal.

Heoretary of State

Oh, that would be an extraordinary result and if they don't know that the British people respond with ever greater determination to this kind of outrage they don't know saything at all. I conclines have felt that they must be in ignorance of that fundamental fact about British people. It is a fundamental fact and you will find from





Warrington, I feel quite sure, as we find here in Morthern Ireland, an absolute determination to house back, to grit the teeth, to carry on with ordinary life. People is a democracy and certainly in the Eritish democracy never give way to force let alone foul and revolting violence of this kind.

Question

Do you think that the Trish in Britain are now under aportous pressure as a result of this attack and, if go, what do you think that you could say to English people in England that would in some way take the heat off the Irish population?

Secretary of state

Well I think that attacks upon people because they are Irish or attacks on people because they are British or any other kind of -ish are absurd and very wrong. It would be very wrong if Irish people were to be attacked by reason of this revolting crime carried out by the IRA. The IRA are not acting on behalf of Irish people. Think of the Irisk people and the contribution that they have made to our country for example, in war as in peace. To behave like that is to behave like the IRA and I am certain that that's not going to bappen because people in our country are not only wise but they are fair.

Question

But doubtless people across the vater will say that these terrorists who carried out those attacks came from this part of the world and they will ask you because you are a Secretary of State for Northern Ireland what it is you are doing to bring these people to book?

Secretary of State

That is a very different question and the IRA know very well of the nature of the opposition that is mounted against them. We don't hear unfortunately on the media enything like abough about the anoseses that the EUC have had last year - over 400 people were charged with tarrorist offance; something like 90 people were charged with murder in terrorist grimes and time and time again the RUC score susceepes

against these people, even over this last weekend. Very significant engages have been scored by the RUO, but of course more could be done, and that needs greater support from people who tolerate the IRA to the extent of not telling the police what they know. That's my message to people. Do not tolerate people who are supable of behaving as evilly and as foully as these people have done.

Question

But surely in response to an atrocity like this and in response to the various atrocities in Northern Ireland the time is now right to turn round and say to the security forces: You're hands are unleashed, go and get those responsible?

Secretary of State

Those who speak like that must answer this question. What is tying the hands of the escurity forces; what is it you want to see done that is different in obseractor from what is being done at the moment. find no enswer to that question except when people are actually frank enough to say: "Well, actually what we mean is that security forces should act outside the law". Now that is not something that I will tolerate, it is not something that the security forces would themselves tolerate and it should never be advocated. This country stands for the rule of law and it is faced with a challenge to the rule of law of very grave dimensions. We must not abandon our own determination that our own forces stay within the law, because if we were to do so we raduce ourselves then to the level of the people whom we are opposing and nothing would please them more. Now this is not to say that nothing more can be done. If the death of this little boy Jonathan, and if the maining of the 12-year-old hoy, and if the injuries to these 56 people in the shopping centre, shopping on Baturday, is to achieve enything it is going to achieve this, I believe, that people are going to ask themselves: "Now such longer cap I go on, not telling the police what I know about this kind of thing being planned is future. How much longer can I go on justifying in my conscience, not telling the police what I know about screething that had beppened in the pest."



Will Warrington and various other terrorist strocities that have taken place in the past six months, a year, figure on the agenda tomorrow for the Anglo-Irish Conference?


Secretary of State

Question

And what do you think the Irish Government would contribute in that debate?

Secretary of State

The Irieb Government is as bitterly opposed to the IRA as the British Government. Of that I have no doubt. People in the South of Ireland similarly, of that I have no doubt. These are people who are a tipy, tipy fraction of the people living in this island and they are regarded with equal revulsion Borth and South of the border within this island. I have no complaint about lack of co-operation. I am vary grateful for the co-operation which exists between the dards and the RUG. Of course there are ways in which with emperience the two forces can work even better together and every time we meet in the conference we explore ways in which that happens. The two Easds of the Police Forces are present on each cocasion. Very good relationship between them as there is between the two forces and each time we explore ways in which batter co-operation can be achieved and I am sure we shall do that tomorrow.

Dick Spring

It was appalling. It was an outrage in fact and something which the Irish Government in vary shocked at.

Will the Irish Government be sending a representative to the funeral?

Dick Spring

The Irish Government will be represented at the funeral and we will be discussing those matters and it's obviously subject to the family's wishes.

Question

What sort of level will that be?

Dick spring

That has to be decided. We have a Dublin meeting in fact this afternoon.

Question

Bir Patrick, the first time that the Irish Government has been represented at a funeral?

Diek Spring

I can't speak for previous years. I think we have been represented in the pant, but certainly there is a sense of outrage - which I have not experienced before - in relation to the death of this child. I have to say there's a terrible sense of anger in the South at what's happened and it does not represent the views of Irish people.

Question

Sir Patrick, what do you think the police forces can do to prevent the kind of thing which happened?





secretary of State

I think that co-operation is the best means by which the two police forces can bear down upon these evil people and I am very glad to be able to say in the presence of the Tanniste that co-operation has never been closer. I think we both agree that this meeting today is evidence of the value of regular meetings between the two Governments, each lead of the police force is here, the Commissioner is here, the chief Constable of the RUG is here and it shows how very valueble it is that there are regular and frequent meetings of the kind that we're going to have today, and I am sure those are matters that are going to be discussed.

Question

Will you be attempting to get the Talks restarted, Mr Spring?

Dick spring

obviously wa both have an interest in getting Talks restarted and we're going to have a wide-ranging discussion on all of the issues and all the matters we want to talk about between us.

Do you think it's possible?

Dick Spring

Well I think we're both optimists ultimately,

That's right. We both want to see the Talks resumed and that's one of the areas we shall be talking about.
