Rerewith text of last night's speech by the Secretary of State in SALINE New York. You will see that the comment that led today's news "it's not going to require any surrender" has been inserted at the end to reflect the speech as delivered. It was not in the draft as the NIO had it yesterday afternoon and very likely was added by Mayhew himself at the last moment. The NIO has not attempted to explain it but Williams drew my attention to a press response by Downing Street saying there is no change in policy. I asked what the internal view was. Williams suggested the comment may have been a momentary incoherence, pointing out that the start of the passage says the British Government will not surrender to terrorism. I suppose the comment could also be taken to mean that no surrender of belief or objective is required of Sinn Fein/IRA. In any event, the British seem content for the moment to let the hare sit.

But, whatever Sinn Fein and the Irish Republican Army may do, the two Governments will hold firmly to the principles of their Joint Declaration. We shall carry on with a whole range of policies to improve the quality of life for people in Northern Irciand and enhance their presperity. In these areas our policies are having a great deal of success already. Any of you who have visited Northern Ireland recently will have seen the new businesses, the good housing and the investment in Infrastructure, which are benefiting the whole community.

We shall also carry on with policies for fair employment, policies to ensure that the policies onjoy the full confidence and support of the whole community for their difficult and dangerous mak; policies to improve healthcare and soutcation in Northern Ireland. And we do put our money where our mouth it. In the last financial year the Government spans 27.5 killion in Northern Ireland - about a third higher par head than the United Elagdom average. Law and order does take a substantial 12% chunk of that spending, that we spend even more on education (17%), health and social services (16%), and social services (16%), and social services (16%).

Carrying on means above all persevering with the search for an agreement. There are no shortcus to that Persuadon and debate take time, But we have an obligation to encourage, decitate and enable squament to be reached through dialogue. That is what the talks process has been about. That is what the Downing Street Declaration is about. begun by pointing to the positive lessons in living together that this city can hold up. But, a you know, it is not always quite that casy. There is a downside too. Here in New York - at much as in Northern Ireland, elsewhere in hirope and across the world - there are also painful examples of how we can get relationships wrong in our modern world. In our homes, our towns, just as much as between governments and people, and between easiens, we are trying to come to terms with new realities, to which we can adapt our identities and institutions.

So we shall hold to the principles and realities. I have surlined.

We shall not surrender to terrorise; ar the threat of violence. I doubt Le enyone would expent us to do so. The ending of the armed conflict which has so afflicted the lives of so many in Morthern Ireland over the last 25 years - the tell to which you Mades Chairman referred in your introduction - that's not; going to require any surrender, the ending of that arend conflict. It's. not going to require any surrouder. It will be cosolved only through a ouncistion of violence, an erwagement in the descoration process, a search for a just peace. underpianed by a political accommodation besed on the principles of demogracy, consent. and parity of esteem for all. That is the prize for which we democrats are striving.

I am very confident that, sticking to our principles, and keeping our eyes firstly fixed on those self-evident truths, we shall in the and succeed.
