THE IRISH FAMINE

Thank you for letting me see a copy of Don Alexander's note of 12 August.

2. The Famine entered my consciousness in another context recently, when I lunched with Canon Nicholas Frayling, the Rector of Liverpool. The Canon - who is of Anglo-Irish descent, and a "friend" of the Institute of Irish Studies at Liverpool University, is currently on a 6 months sabbatical in the Republic. Amongst the ideas he is working on is one for a Service of Contrition in Liverpool Cathedral next year, at which "Britain" can express its deep regret for its treatment of its Irish citizens 150 years ago. To the Canon's obvious surprise and disappointment I was less than enthusiastic about the idea making the same point that Mr Alexander does in his note, namely that the dreadful events of 1840s must be seen against the laissez-faire background of their time. I said a service could stir up more emotion than it spent. Although the Canon promised to reflect on my remarks I think he had already decided to go ahead and we shall therefore probably hear more about the idea in the coming months.
