	Said Mr Thompson: "We are concerned, firstly, that these allegations of collusion, which are contained in formal witness statement, are not going to be probed.	na
	"Secondly, we are concerned at the stark difference in the content of the two statements issued by the PSNI on this matter.	
	"Thirdly, we believe that the allegations merit a broader investigation into what collusion was going on in this area between soldiers and police and loyalist paramilitaries."	
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
